#### INTRODUCTION

#### **Program Statement**

EarlyON Child and Family Centres in the Nipissing District provide parents and caregivers with a warm, welcoming and inclusive environment for children in the early years. It is our goal to provide families with access to high quality services and support them in their role as their children's first teachers, enhance their well-being, and enrich their knowledge about early learning and development. EarlyON Centres are dedicated to supporting the relationships between families and their children by giving them a place where they can come together and engage in positive, meaningful experiences.

We know that children are competent, capable, curious, and rich in potential, and that parents and caregivers are pivotal in helping their children reach their fullest potential. We believe in a family-centred, strength-based and holistic approach to children's health and development, and we work collaboratively to ensure families are informed about, and connected to, other community services they may require.

#### Scope

This report will primarily provide data and information pertaining to the adults and children who attended EarlyON Child & Family Centres in the District of Nipissing between January 1 and December 31, 2019. In addition, comparisons will be made to the baseline report from 2018 to determine trends in the usage of EarlyON Centres so that we may support and improve planning and service delivery for all community partners providing services to children in the District of Nipissing.

#### **Data Collection**

The data contained in this report is sourced from the Client Information Management System (CIMS), which is a web-based information and data system used by EarlyON Child & Family Centres in the District of Nipissing to collect attendance and registration information.

The data analysis was conducted using reports from CIMS and Tableau Business Intelligence & Analytics Software. Please note percentages may not add to 100 due to rounding error and/or data suppression. Please see Appendix A for the EarlyON Child & Family Centre Registration Form, which is used to gather demographic information.


#### Limitations

Although all adults attending EarlyON Child & Family Centres in the District of Nipissing are asked to complete a registration form, not all demographic information is mandatory to complete the registration process. As such, some data elements may be 'missing' from the record. Furthermore, if an adult does not

consent to have their information in CIMS, the adult and child would be counted manually, but may not be counted towards the unique numbers of adult and children served.

Due to the nature of CIMS requiring EarlyON staff to enter the registration information manually into the system, there is a high possibility of data entry errors. All efforts have been made to reduce the number of errors by delivering an in-depth training course to all providers, ensuring consistency with definitions and guidelines when inputting data into CIMS. The Data Coordinator also checks the data regularly for errors, omissions and double entries.

#### DISTRICT OF NIPISSING EARLYON CHILD & FAMILY CENTRES



The graphic above represents the EarlyON Child & Family Centres that were operating as of December 31, 2019. There were a total of 22 EarlyON locations across the district, 15 of which were located in schools. French and/or Bilingual programming was offered at 54% of EarlyON Centres, as indicated with an asterisk in the table above.

Evening programs were offered monthly at EarlyON West Nipissing Main Site (Let's Build Together) and EarlyON Ste-Marguerite d'Youville (Electric Kitchen), bi-monthly at EarlyON EW Norman (Play, Dine & Dash), and weekly at EarlyON Temagami (Family Gym Night) and EarlyON Chippewa (variety of programs).

Additionally, weekend programs were offered every second week at EarlyON West Nipissing Main Site (Breakfast Club) and EarlyON Ste-Marguerite d'Youville (Get Active), as well as weekly at EarlyON Chippewa (variety of programs).

#### Notes:

- EarlyON EW Norman increased their 'Play, Dine & Dash' evening program to bi-monthly instead of monthly in November 2019. They also remained open for the month of July, whereas they were closed for July and August in 2018.
- EarlyON Ste-Marguerite d'Youville in Verner began offering a weekend program every second week, as well as a monthly evening program, in March 2019.
- EarlyON Odyssée began offering services in May 2019.

## **EARLYON CHILD & FAMILY CENTRES ATTENDANCE**

#### **Unique Served vs. Total Visits**

When adults (parents/caregivers) and children are registered in CIMS, they are provided with a unique identifier that allows us to track attendance information for adults and children, regardless of which site they attend within the District of Nipissing. The definitions below apply to both adults and children registered in the system.

**Served:** the unique number of adults or children that participated in an EarlyON program during the year indicated. Each adult or child is only counted once, regardless of the number of visits they've made throughout the year.

**Visits:** the total number of visits made by adults or children to an EarlyON program during the year indicated.

## **Overall Attendance for 2019**

In 2019, there were a total of **1,648** unique registered adults served for a total of **16,182** visits made to EarlyON Child & Family Centres within the District of Nipissing. This represents an increase in the number of unique adults served and a **4.6**% increase in the number of visits made by adults compared to 2018.

Furthermore, there were a total of **2,027** unique children served for a total of **22,409** visits made to EarlyON Centres within our district. This represents a **6**% increase in the number of unique children served, and a **10**% increase in the number of visits made by children compared to 2018.

Table 1 below presents the unique number of registered adults and children served as well as total visits for each of the EarlyON Child & Family Centres that were operational in 2019. Please note that adding the unique number served for each site within an agency will not equal the sub-total for that agency. Adults and/or children may have attended multiple sites within an agency and will appear in the number served for each site attended, but they will only be counted once in the agency sub-total. The same is true of the grand total, as adults and/or children may have attended multiple sites across different agencies but will only be counted once in the grand total.



#### **Attendance Trends**

Examining the trends in attendance data monthly can help us monitor the usage of EarlyON Centres across the district. As can be seen in the graphs below, the trends in attendance are generally similar between 2018 and 2019, with slightly higher numbers in 2019. In February 2019, there was a clear decrease in the

trend for both numbers served and total visits. This can be attributed to the number of snow days that occurred in February (6), resulting in the closing of 11 programs that month.



#### **Number of EarlyON Centres Attended**


As can be seen in Table 2, there is a higher percentage of children (44.1%) than adults (29.1%) who attend more than one EarlyON Centre location. This is not surprising given that a child may be linked with multiple adults in the system. Although it would be expected that some participants would only attend one site, especially in our rural areas that only have one site, it is encouraging to see a slight increase in the use of multiple locations across children and adults since 2018 (42.8% and 28.8% in 2018, respectively).

## **Frequency of Visits per Adult**


Approximately 28% of adults only made one visit to an EarlyON Centre in 2019, 45% visited between 2-10 times, and roughly 27% attended 11 or more times. These results are comparable to the 2018 attendance records.



In 2019, an EarlyON First Visit Survey was implemented to gauge first impressions of the EarlyON Child & Family Centres. According to this survey, approximately 91% of adults said they would be likely to return to an EarlyON Child & Family Centre for programs and services (i.e. 7 or more on a scale of 1-10), and 96% said they would recommend EarlyON program and services to others.

#### **Adult Attendance by Neighbourhood**

We have divided the District of Nipissing into various neighbourhoods by combining Statistics Canada Dissemination Areas (DA's). Using postal code information from the registration forms, we are able to determine the neighbourhoods in which adults attending EarlyON Centres are coming from. However, there are some limitations to this process. For instance, some registration forms are missing postal code information, some postal codes can span multiple DA's, and some adults may have moved but may not have updated their registration information. Therefore, the neighbourhood information provided represents an approximation of where adults are coming from to attend EarlyON Child & Family Centres.

The neighbourhoods within the District of Nipissing with the most adults who visited an EarlyON Centre in 2019 was West Ferris (251), followed by the Central/Downtown neighbourhood (235), Pinewood (160) and Graniteville (114). As in 2018, just over 7% of adults are visiting from neighbouring districts, including 118 adults from Parry Sound District and 4 adults from the Sudbury District. Another point to consider is that almost 9% of adults (147) did not provide postal code information and therefore cannot be mapped.

## PROGRAMS OFFERED AT EARLYON CENTRES

The EarlyON Child & Family Centres in the District of Nipissing offered over **41** different programs and services to adults and children in 2019, including **7 new programs** (marked with an asterisk). Table 3 provides a list of the various programs and services offered along with the total number of visits to each program by adults and children.

It is important to note that not all programs and services are offered at all EarlyON Centres in the district, or on a regular basis. All programs having the same name and/or similar content (e.g. Special Activity) have been combined, regardless of which agency is delivering the program.

#### REFERRALS

In order to monitor the needs of adults and children that are attending EarlyON Child & Family Centres in the District of Nipissing, EarlyON practitioners are asked to record the type and number of referrals that are made to various organizations and services in the community using CIMS. Referrals are either made when an adult asks for information, or when a practitioner offers information if they see an area of concern.

There were a total of 155 referrals made to a variety of organizations and services in 2019. This represents a large decrease from the number of referrals recorded in 2018; however, some agencies did not track their referrals in 2019 due to a misunderstanding regarding reporting requirements. The following table provides a breakdown of the number of referrals made to each organization and type of service.


The highest proportion of referrals was made to LIPI for financial assistance (25.8%), of which 30 referrals were for the Santa Fund program. The next highest referrals were for One Kids Place Children's Treatment Centre (10.3%) and KidSport (10.3%).

#### **DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION**

Demographic information is available for most adults and children who have registered at an EarlyON Child & Family Centre in the District of Nipissing. As mentioned previously, it is possible that the information collected on the original registration form has changed but may not be updated in CIMS.

## **Age of Participants**

Ages are calculated as of December 31, 2019. The 'Missing' category represents adults and children who do not have their birth date entered into the system. As can be seen in the graph below, 75.5% of adults attending EarlyON Child & Family Centres were between the ages of 25-44 years old, which is comparable to 2018 results. There were also a smaller percentage of adults under the age of 24 years (6.3%) in comparison to 2018 (8.4%).




The majority of children attending EarlyON Centres were 4 years of age or younger (65%), which is not surprising given that most children begin attending school between the ages of 4 and 5 years. We did see a **slight increase** in the number of children attending that are 5 years of age or older in 2019 compared to 2018 (21.3% vs. 18.4%). This may be due to the increase in the number of evening and weekend programs, in

which families are likely to bring their older children as well. Also of note, 14.4% of children (292 children) are missing their birth date information in the system and therefore their age cannot be calculated. This represents a slight increase in the number of children who are missing their birth date information compared to 2018.


#### Language Spoken at Home

In order to ensure we meet the language and cultural needs of families attending EarlyON centres across the District of Nipissing, it is important to examine the language spoken most often at home to gain an understanding of the needs for each neighbourhood or community.



As in previous years, the majority of adults attending EarlyON Centres reported speaking **English** only in the home, while **6**% reported speaking **French** only in the home, up from 5% in 2018.


The following graphs illustrate the language(s) spoken in the home of adults by the EarlyON Centres they attend. Those centres that offer French or Bilingual services are marked with an asterisk.




- EarlyON Whitney (100%), EarlyON Phelps (94%), EarlyON MFRC (93%), and EarlyON Temagami (92%) have the highest percentage of English speaking adults.
- The EarlyON Centres with the highest percentage of families who speak only French in the home included all West Nipissing sites: EarlyON Ste-Marguerite d'Youville in Verner (60%), EarlyON Jeunesse Active (40%), EarlyON West Nipissing Main Site (37%) and EarlyON Saint-Joseph (35%) in Sturgeon Falls, and EarlyON Christ-Roi in River Valley (32%)
- 100% of EarlyON Child & Family Centres attended by adults who spoke only French in the home offered French or Bilingual services

### **Indigenous Identity**

The figures below illustrate Indigenous self-identification by adults and children attending EarlyON Child & Family Centres in the District of Nipissing. Approximately 8% of adults and 7% of children self-identified as having Indigenous ancestry, which is comparable to the 2018 attendance records.




The following graph illustrates the Indigenous identity of children by the EarlyON Centre attended.



- The EarlyON Centres in which more than 20% of children self-identified as Indigenous include EarlyON Madawaska (24% First Nations) and EarlyON Ste-Marguerite d'Youville (20.1%; 16.3% Métis and 3.8% First Nations).
- EarlyON Mariale, EarlyON MFRC and EarlyON Temagami did not have any children self-identify as Indigenous

#### **Marital Status**

The following graph represents the marital status of those attending EarlyON Child & Family Centres in 2019.




As in previous years, the majority of adults attending EarlyON Child & Family Centres fall into the married or common-law category. However, we did see a slight decrease in the percentage of lone parents in 2019 (10.6% vs. 11.7% in 2018), and a slight increase in the percentage of adults who did not provide a response to this question (9.7% vs. 7.1%).

#### **Educational Status**

The figure below indicates the highest level of education completed by adults who attended an EarlyON Child & Family Centre in 2019.


There was a slight increase in the number of adults who had completed some form of Post-Secondary education compared to 2018 (59% in 2018 vs. 63.6% in 2019).

There was also a slight decrease in the percentage of adults who did not respond to this question (18.4%) compared to 2018 (20.3%).



#### **Employment Status**

The figure below presents the employment status of those adults who attended EarlyON Child & Family Centres in 2019.



There was a **slight increase** in the number of adults in the workforce (working full or part time) compared to 2018 (29.4% in 2018 vs. 33.5% in 2019).


There was also a **slight increase** in the number of adults who indicated being an at-home parent or on parental leave (27% in 2018 vs. 40.8% in 2019).

Caution should be used when interpreting the parental leave category, as the status may not have been updated when the parent returned to work.

#### **Annual Household Income**

Examining the annual household income of participants allows us to determine if EarlyON Child & Family Centres programs and services are equally accessible, regardless of income level.

Approximately 46% of adults either did not respond, did not disclose, or were not sure of their annual household income. The graph pictured here indicates that 26% of adults have an annual household income of < \$60,000, representing a slight decrease from 2018 (28%), while 33% have an annual household income of > \$60,000., which represents a slight increase from 2018 (29%).



#### **SUMMARY**

In 2019, we have seen an increase in the number of registered adults and children attending EarlyON Child & Family Centres in the District of Nipissing. Some key highlights include the addition of a Francophone EarlyON Centre in the Graniteville neighbourhood (EarlyON Odyssée), as well as an increase in the number of evening and weekend programs available to families who are unable to attend during the day on weekdays.

In the following year, we are hoping to increase the number of families served by introducing an EarlyON Mobile Unit, which will be travelling to our currently underserviced areas to ensure that all families in the District of Nipissing have access to quality early years programs. The North Bay Indigenous Hub will also be operating an EarlyON Child & Family Centre, which is scheduled to open in March 2020.
